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HE MOVES EVEN IN THE DARKNESS: HEALING AND RESTORATION IN SRI LANKA

“It’s an economic crisis that was brought on by a political crisis, and now, we’re just generally in crisis.” – Al Jazeera Start Here with Sandra Gathman.

A once self-sufficient nation, Sri Lanka is now reeling from bankruptcy. One crisis has led to another, a downward spiral that has quickly escalated into the freefall of a nation.

Even before the COVID-19 pandemic, the country was already headed towards a fall. It began with the 2019 Easter bombings where three churches and three luxury hotels in Colombo became target of Islamic groups. These bombings initially baffled the nation as there was no provocation from Christians. It turns out these bombings were politically motivated, a tactic to regain power. These politically motivated attacks did propel certain people into power, but they also did so much harm to the Sri Lankan economy- a country that has been highly dependent on tourism.

The year after, the COVID-19 Pandemic hit, and the tourism industry continued to plummet... and so did the Sri Lankan economy.

In addition to that, the pandemic was severely mismanaged. Resources were severely exploited. Vaccines that could have been bought at a lower price were foregone for those of a higher cost because those in power got a bigger cut.

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All these along with policies that did more damage than good.

Corruption was on the rise and media freedom was suppressed. The amount of stealing was not discovered up until the country found itself bankrupt in the middle of last year. The people hadn't known what hit them until it was too late and the economy's free fall was inevitable.

The economic freefall of Sri Lanka meant that the nation could no longer import, even the most basic of goods, be it milk or fuel. Inflation has skyrocketed even as income levels have remained the same. This has resulted in having 50% of the population living below the poverty line. Protests have erupted in the capital since the beginning of April. Yes, it was peaceful until Mahinda Rajapaksa, the prime minister resigned, although the president, Gotabaya Rajapaksa, remained in power. That was when things began to turn violent.

The few thousands who supported the Prime Minister turned against the peaceful protesters, destroying their tents, pulled down their banners, and even assaulting the protesters.

And violence does beget violence. The protesters in turn burned down many homes of government officials, including the president's ancestral home.

It has been chaos and deep darkness, pain and despair.

But amid that, the Lord is doing something that has not never been seen in the nation's history- and our member schools have witnessed it for themselves.

We have five accredited member schools in Sri Lanka: Assemblies of God Bible College, Baldaeus Theological College, Colombo Theological Seminary,

Lanka Bible College and Seminary, and LIFE Bible College- along with one associate member as well. While we did try to hear out the stories of member schools, it was not feasible to do so and ended up with only three. So, here are their stories both of struggle and victory amid the ongoing crisis their nation is facing...

The story of Colombo Theological Seminary

Colombo Theological Seminary's story of struggle began even prior to the nationwide crisis. Being a seminary with seven extension centers, which are also called provincial centers, faculty travel and teach modular classes in those centers. But the pandemic brought these all to a halt. While CTS has been able to resume classes in these centers at some point, the instability began to set in and once again disrupted them. The political crisis has also raised questions if the seminary will indeed be able to continue in the following months.

But the leaders of CTS have found themselves concerned not just with the operations of the school itself but also with its students- who are mostly Christian workers. With the current crisis of Sri Lanka, the biggest problem looming for Christian workers is the threat of survival. While those in the rural areas can easily plant food to get by, most Christian workers are landless and rely on small communities for income. CTS wants to create a safety net for these Christian workers- most of whom are also part of the CTS family- and it has been an overwhelmingly huge task.

The disruption of education along with the economic challenges and the emotional and psychological disruption of families have created a lot of anxiety in the homes. CTS, with 800 students and 650 alumni, has a large network of Christian leaders to care for, of whom several remain economically vulnerable.

The challenges are great but the Lord's faithfulness to CTS has been greater still.

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For one, the Lord had already prepared CTS to continue its mission amid the global pandemic and the lockdown that ensued. Even before the COVID-19 pandemic, CTS began developing an online infrastructure as part of the Vital Sustainability Initiative (VSI). So, when the lockdown took effect, CTS had 6 weeks to prepare for the implementation of the online infrastructure they were developing. The Lord blessed their efforts, and they were able to launch 40 classes online that term. So, amid the pandemic and the 2-year lockdown, the institution continued to operate, uninterrupted, pursuing its God given mission.

But more than simply being able to continue, this also opened another education platform for the school and grew the institution. Because of the newly developed online infrastructure, CTS was able to begin innovating CTS Global. CTS aims for this to be a platform in which to provide theological education on a global scale and allows the institution to better serve the region. Through CTS Global, CTS aims to equip Kingdom workers among the Sri Lankan Diaspora, many of which are first generation Christians, but of course is also open to non-Sri Lankans too. So now, CTS has three educational platforms: CTS- Capital, the main campus of the school, located in Colombo; CTS- Provincial, and yes, the new CTS- Global. While CTS- Global is still at its early stages, the leadership of CTS is still very thankful that the Lord has led the school to it.

But apart from that, the Lord has not only provided for CTS, but also kept the morale of its staff up during such a time when the economy was beginning to plummet. As salary cuts have become a common practice in every industry- and thus employee demoralization became common place- CTS maintained the salary of its staff and cut down on other expenditures instead. This was not a logical decision given the situation of CTS, but the leaders have learned to listen to the minority – the one dissenting voice – for which they are very grateful. As CTS stepped forth in , the Lord has been faithful to provide- and the morale of the staff was kept afloat.

Amid the chaos, the Lord is working- and that is not only true for CTS but for the entire nation of Sri Lanka as well, healing the nation, bringing an awareness and a visible manifestation of unity that

has never been seen in the nation’s history. From the occupation of the British, its independence in 1948, and even up until the present, those in power have always used the “divide and conquer” tactic. It has always been us versus them... until this crisis and the protests that ensued. People have now realized that the power-hungry politicians have fooled them. Now, the protest sites are sites of diversity: Muslims, Buddhists, Hindus, and Christians – all together hand in hand. The crisis has led to a public acknowledgement that they are indeed one Sri Lanka.

This oneness manifested itself not only in words, but also through deeds. In the protest sites, you will see how people of different races and religions care for and even protect one another. The Lord is bringing forth a healthy pluralism in the public square.



The protests have been the first national struggle since the fight against the British and has been a rich nation building exercise. The entire movement, a leaderless one, has been powered by the youth, a generation that is very pro-justice and pro-equality.

Amid all this the church is learning the importance of embracing a theology of presence. The church is realizing that one need not preach in every given moment, that there is so much value in just simply being there, quietly serving. The Sri Lankan church sees that amid the chaos, it can be salt and light as it serves the poor, assists in medical aid... and just being present in this time of crisis. These actions will surely promote the kind of Christianity the church wants to show. It opens a nation once so prejudiced to the gospel to consider its great appeal of love.

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The Lord is moving and healing the nation of Sri Lanka and we can join Him there by praying with the Sri Lankan church...

... for the church to fully embrace the theology of presence and for a full and deeper commitment to service, one that is not manipulative.

... and for a renewed spiritual generosity.

The Story of Baldeaus Theological College

“God does not leave us alone in our darkest hour.” ~Professor Dushy Hoole

(BTC), located in Triconmalee, Sri Lanka, was born 25 years ago. An area that was battered by a 40-year war, there were a lot of internally displaced people and eventually churches sprung up- but the workers were untrained. So, a man named Charles Hoole started BTC in this post war area and ministered to the people.

Being a post war area made the already difficult situation more difficult in this time of crisis. Poverty is extreme and even the most fundamental things are not available- such as fuel. Electricity has become expensive and power cuts are now the norm. Amid the lack of the basics, even whatever produce that is available is substandard.

In addition to all that is the unnecessary harassment the citizens in the area have been receiving. The government has restricted travel and put check points in place, with inspections that intimidate ordinary citizens.

All the difficulty has taken a toll on the mental health of the people... and the leadership of BTC hopes that the people hold up. And as BTC perseveres in hope, it comes alongside the people in their area. While it is mostly the Roman Catholic Churches that are helping, BTC is doing its best by subsidizing food bills.

Even as BTC is doing its best to minister to the people where they are at, the institution does have its own share of challenges. Over the past two years, the school did not take any new students because of COVID. Alongside that, the school went through an organizational crisis that caused its funds to come in



only by trickles. So, to augment their income, BTC rented out rooms, but that too was sluggish because of the pandemic.

Persevering in the mission entrusted to the school was not an easy task. The students who stayed on were not able to take residence on campus and it was not possible to have everyone in a class at the same time. What BTC did was to travel to its students. That was not an easy endeavor either, but the Lord enabled BTC to keep on.

While the challenges have been big, but the Lord has proven Himself to be bigger still. For one, even if the funds began to only trickle down, there were people who still supported the work of BTC. Even pastors went running around and helping, even in IT literacy. Even churches, who lost most of their foreign funding, in their poverty have continued to help.

But one of the most beautiful things that the Lord has done in this dark time, was how, amid the intense suffering, each member of the community was just being a source of comfort for one another, each one helping another. This joint suffering only helped to strengthen the community and all those in it.

As the Lord is strengthening the Sri Lankan church in this crisis of its nation, the leaders of BTC hope that the Christians who are in government will speak up against the injustice and not fall into the mold of the system and bend to it.

As the Lord is moving in the life of BTC and of Sri Lanka, we can join in by praying along with BTC for...

...a strong board. Please pray for the election of a new board.

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...Let us pray for the strengthening of BTC's students who have pressed on and that the Lord will bring the school more students, more pastors to be formed.

... the church as it is under pressure from the government to play down Christianity. Pray that the church will not crack under this pressure. Pray also for encouragement from established places for the church amid the trials and the pressure.

... for Sri Lanka as a whole, that the Lord will grant the nation leaders with a conscience, who can identify with the poor, and have integrity. Pray also for the children of the nation who are suffering the most, with no school and the threat of malnutrition hovering over them daily.

The Story of Lanka Bible College and Seminary

"The church must learn to think beyond their boundaries and reach out to people in love and service." ~ Dr. Lal Senanayake

If there was anything that can be said about the current economic crisis of Sri Lanka, it is that it continues to dramatically spiral down. It has been reported that as of March, the inflation rate is already at 133%, six times the official rate of the government. Everything is in short supply and the income of each household has lost purchasing power. It is a dire situation that has left everyone in a pit of challenges, and Lanka Bible College and Seminary is no exception.

Lanka Bible College and Seminary (LBCS) is a residential school and amid the rising costs, along with the uncertainty, and unpredictability of the country's situation, it's been very difficult to run and keep. With inflation at an all-time high and the significant devaluation of the Sri Lankan rupee, the increased cost of living has left students unable to pay their fees and left LBCS struggling to pay the salaries of its staff. The low salaries of staff have, on the other hand, left the college facing the loss of some of its staff.

As challenges continue to loom over LBCS, the school's needs continue to present themselves to its leadership. There is the need to train new faculty and staff... and the need to for building maintenance...

and even the need to restart the English language program... and the list goes on and seems to have no end.

But despite all these, the Lord continues to be faithful! In the most mysterious ways, the Lord provides! In fact, most of the staff have helped in the physical labor of maintaining the building and have thus contributed to bringing down the costs.

The Lord also continues to bring the Sri Lankan church closer to His heart. Amid the worsening crises of the country where people's hopes are falling apart, He opened a door of opportunity for the Sri Lankan church to guide the people to in something solid and meaningful through effective Christian witness. As the darkness continues to loom over the country and is in fact getting the deeper, the church has found itself needing to learn to think beyond its boundaries and reach out to people in love and service, engaging in holistic ministry for the whole society.

Of course, the Lord is also working in the life of the nation of Sri Lanka, exposing the vanity of trusting in all things apart from Him- from the economy, material things, and even religion. The social and political unrest has caused utter confusion in the country and has dismantled the absolute trust of the people in their human leaders. The Lord is showing the nation that it is HIM they truly need.

And to make matters more exciting, the Lord is bringing Sri Lankan communities into true and tangible unity. Regardless of class, creed, or economic status, the once divided society is now standing together with one objective. What a beautiful sight it is!

As the Lord continues to work in and through the ministry of LBCS, the Sri Lankan Church and the



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nation and people of Sri Lanka, He invites us to join in through prayer- and these are the ways we can do so...

...Please pray for the sustainability of this institution during this difficult time.

... LBCS is working on a new intervention (Series of Seminars) to educate senior leaders and decision makers of the local churches in Sri Lanka about the need for holistic approach to ministry in this post-COVID context of Sri Lanka. Sri Lanka has over 500 years of Christian history- and it can be traced back to 73 AD. Sadly, the Christian impact on society is minimal. The public perception of Christianity in Sri Lanka has been undesirable... alongside this, the socio-economic situation along with the rapidly deteriorating moral values. Evil, corruption, injustice, and poverty are on the rise. What is the role of the church in such a context? How can we bring about genuine social and spiritual transformation? How can the church make a transformational impact on Society? What is the theological foundation to understand this human predicament and how can the church respond to this reality? So, clearly, there is a need for the message of the Gospel of the Kingdom of God to be applied to the whole person and to the context of the person. Often the churches have been involved only in Evangelistic activities for the spiritual salvation of the person only and other aspects of life are often overlooked. This program will integrate theological education, the Great Commission (Evangelism and making of effective disciples), great commandment (loving God and loving the neighbor—spiritual and social development), leading to holistic formation of the person. The purpose is to mobilize the church to be an agent of transformation in the society. Please pray for the success of this program so that leaders will have a transformational experience.

...Please pray for Sri Lanka. Political protests and sufferings of the poor people are rising. There have been instances when people tried to illegally migrate to Australia in boats and many died in the process. The new trend now is to escape in boats to India to get necessities. Please pray for a change in this corrupt system and for justice to prevail.

...Please pray for a proper education and training of pastors. The inappropriate and lackadaisical training programs are rapidly emerging and producing immature pastors. These unprepared pastors and Christian workers are causing many problems in the mission field, damaging the image of Christianity.

Christianity is humiliated and looked down upon. Please pray that this situation will improve.

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The situation of Sri Lanka does seem dire and the road to recovery looks long and tiresome. But the stories of our member schools have shown that even in the darkest, direst of situations, there will always be glimmers of hope. While the darkness hovers, God's light continues to shine and no crisis can stop Him from healing, restoring, renewing, and making all things new.

Evaluation Visits in the Second Quarter of 2022

In the second quarter of this year, Visiting Evaluation Teams have once again been sent out to different parts of the globe. This time, the visits have been done in a more hybrid kind of fashion- with some team members joining via zoom while others are onsite. So, these are the visits that have been done in this quarter:

Visit to Houston Bible Seminary

With the Lord’s vision given to its President, Dr. Shaji Daniel, and his ministry colleagues, all from India, Houston Bible Seminary, Texas USA, was instituted in 2018 and from its inception, HBS has been offering online education to “prepare faithful servant-leaders who reflect Christ in their life and ministry with deep passion and dedication to serving God and humanity...”

Its training objectives are:

- Systematic theological education with ecclesiastical and societal dimension
- Training students with a holistic approach
- Formation of Christ-centered servant leaders with academic excellence
- A harmonious well-disciplined spiritual life and ministerial formation for serving God and humanity

- Empowering the students to stand for the cause of the Gospel of Jesus Christ

HBS’ initial meeting was held at the Christian Assembly of Houston, welcoming students and faculty from various Christian denominations. And three years since its founding, the seminary has become one of the most progressive evangelical distance education centers among Asian immigrants in the United States. When asked about the significance of developing more spiritual leaders, Dr. Shaji Daniel responded: "the world needs more progressive, mission-oriented, and servant leaders in a way that we have never needed them before. We need progressive, loving, embracing spiritual leaders who understand the importance of community and work together to impact the world for God."

HBS became a member of ATA in 2019 and this year, on May 16-18, went through the accreditation evaluation of its Master of Divinity and Bachelor of Theology programs. The Visiting Evaluation Team (VET) was composed of Dr. Theresa Lua, General Secretary, Dr. Paul Cornelius, Regional Secretary, ATA India, and Rev. Shaiju Thomas, Secretary-Value Added Services, ATA India. Drs Lua and Cornelius were physically present onsite, while Rev Shaiju Thomas participated via Zoom from India.

Before the accreditation visit, HBS held its first ever graduation on May 14th at the International Bible Church, one of its key ministry partners. Dr. Theresa Lua was the commencement speaker and Dr. Paul Cornelius also gave words of exhortation.

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The visit to Houston Bible Seminary was Hybrid with 2 members of the team onsite and one on zoom. Dr. Theresa Lua also spoke during the graduation.

While this is a purely online visit, the local VET member, Prof. Ronnie Poon, visited the campus to inspect the facilities.

COMING SOON: ATA NORTH AMERICA!

Over the years, the Lord has been faithful to grow the ministry of ATA, not just in Asia, but even beyond! He has grown the membership of ATA in North America to include 23 member schools in both the US and Canada- 10 of which are accredited and 13 are associate. With this, Dr. Theresa Lua, on June 24, 2022, convened the leaders of the 10 accredited schools in this region via zoom to discuss the proposal to form ATA North America. These 10 schools are: Canadian Chinese School of Theology, Chinese Online School of Theology, Christian Leadership Institute, Faith Bible Seminary, GETS Theological Seminary, Global Mission Seminary, Houston Bible Seminary, International Theological Seminary, Logos Evangelical Seminary, and Timothy Training International. Present also in this meeting was ATA Board Chair, Dr. Andreas Himawan.

The proposal to form ATA North America was met with much enthusiasm and support from the group! The group believes that the formation of a North American Regional Chapter will facilitate mutual


support and collaboration among the ATA member schools in the region. The group further believes that the formation of this Regional Chapter is a much-needed step to enhance the connections and communications with the larger ATA family.

Elected as leaders of ATA North America were Dr. Evan Hsu as Chairperson and Dr. Joseph Shao as Regional Secretary. Dr. Shao was ATA's 4th General Secretary and also served as President of the Biblical Seminary of the Philippines; upon his retirement he moved to the US and currently serves as faculty at the Global Mission Seminary in California.

Regional Chapters are the arms of ATA to coordinate regional contextual efforts to facilitate the implementation of ATA policies and objectives and promote the ATA cause within their regions.

The formation of ATA North America, along with the appointment of the Chairperson and Regional Secretary, will first be presented to the ATA Executive Board for approval and then to the ATA General Assembly for ratification.

We are looking forward to seeing a strong bond and fruitful collaboration among ATA schools in North America as ATA North America begins to take flight! ♦
